

# Certificate III in Acting (Screen) 22576VIC

#### **Aim**

To develop student knowledge of the variety of careers available in the Film and Television industries – as well as to develop students' acting and technical competence. It provides the fundamental information for entry into this industry while developing actor skills and individual student growth. The Certificate III extends on skills and knowledge extending in relevance to long-term life skills and interest.

The general purpose of this course is to provide the skills, knowledge and attitudes for training in acting for film and television. The Course has been written to create career opportunities for peripheral creative industries. It also promotes pathways into tertiary education.

The first year course focuses on an overview of the film and TV industry, governing bodies, film and TV careers and skills, types of auditions, audition preparation, script knowledge and development, skills and abilities for acting in front of camera. Practical filming lessons alternate between theory lessons.

The second year focuses on rehearsing and performing scripts, performance in front of camera, screen tests, rehearsing and filming scenes and styles, protocols and knowledge of the film and TV industry, camera techniques and filming styles. Students elect one extra unit of competency with each having a focus on a specific party of the industry. Presenting to camera, Shoot TV, Direct performances and audition and select performers.

Credit towards VCE/ VCE VM:	VCE and VCE VM: Block credit arrangements are available for this program.
ATAR contribution:	This subject does not have a study score and therefore cannot contribute towards the student's primary four. Subject to VTAC policy, where a Units 3 & 4 sequence is available and satisfactorily completed, it may be counted as a 5th or 6th subject and contribute towards their ATAR (10% of the lowest of the primary four scaled).
Cost:	students need to check with their home school regarding cost of course and required resource costs
Recommendation:	It would be anticipated that students choosing this course would be currently studying Drama (either at school and/or privately) and who also have an agent—although both are not essential. Other appropriate studies include VCE Drama, VCE Theatre Studies.
Industry Interaction:	Some industry experience will be integrated into the course through:  • Visits to suitable film/television/stage environments (if available)  • Visits/lectures/workshops from guest speakers (e.g. Media Entertainment Arts Alliance, Casting Consultants and Agents, Film and Television Director, Acting and Acting Action Tutors.)  Excursions: Students will be required to attend compulsory VET Industry Days and visits to set (if available) run throughout the duration of the course.
